She volunteers within the community. She has joined committees to promote civic week and she has represented Coldstream throughout the borders and beyond. There won't be much she hasn't done for the town. Flodden day alone she works tirelessly, from working on the gate at Flodden field to clearing tables at the end of the ball to more recent years supervising on the torchlight procession. When he retired from his Head Teacher's post at Swinton Primary School in 2010, John became Jock Law's "apprentice", working alongside him and Dick Mitchell on the Christmas Lights.

After a short time, he became the lead man on this annual project which starts in November each year running through to the end of January. Completely voluntarily, John does all the paperwork for SBC & Scottish Power, plans the display, maintains the lights, orders the real Christmas Trees and manages the putting up and taking down of them – not to mention dealing with the numerous calls and e-mails from the townsfolk when they spot some have gone out and need replacing! He has done significant fund raising for them as well over the 13 years he has held this post.

In addition to his Christmas Lights commitment, John has also been Editor of Coldstream Community News for the last 10 years, a huge task to meet the deadlines for the 4 issues per year, with John not only physically creating CCN from articles submitted by members of the public but raising funds to meet the cost, searching out advertisers and billing them. He distributes the printed versions amongst his delivery team and also makes it available on-line.

There have been a few occasions we know of where John & Pat have had to defer holiday bookings in order to facilitate the issue of an edition of CCN.

John's ongoing dedication to these two arms of Coldstream Gateway Association is hugely appreciated and will be a difficult act to follow.

Coldstream Community Larder

On Monday 3 July the Coldstream Community Larder was officially opened by Jeanna Swan, Lord Lieutenant for Berwickshire, and Harry Shepherd, the 2023 Coldstreamer. We have now had a full month in our lovely new premises in the Community Annexe in the grounds of the primary school and have seen the footfall dramatically increase. Our main aim is to reduce food waste and we collect fresh produce from local supermarkets, including our local Co-op, which would otherwise go to landfill. We have received home grown fruit and vegetables from local gardeners when they have had a surplus. It ALL goes to a good home and as little as possible is binned. The Larder is there for YOU so do come and visit when we are open. Our opening hours with effect from September are Tuesday 8am - 10am (this is an hour earlier than usual to catch the school run), Thursday, 5pm - 7pm, Friday 1pm - 2pm (after our Sainsbury pick up) and Saturday 8pm -9pm (after our M&S pick up). These openings are all dependant on availability of volunteers.

Our opening would not have been possible without the hard work of our volunteers and without generous funding. Our thanks go to Berwickshire Housing Association, Development Trust Association Scotland whose funding enabled us to buy our display fridge and freezer and to Hudson Hirsel for our second display fridge as well as shelving. An enormous thank you to Neil and Stephen from PMR who came to our rescue when we realised the new fridge would not get through the door. Bish-bash-bosh - job done in minutes!

The next big project is the community garden which is situated next to our building. There is a fair bit of shade so will require some clever planning to make the best use of the space. We have invested in a "hot bin" which will help create lovely compost from any food waste we have.



COLDSTREAM PREMIER CRU CYCLING CLUB

This year to date we haven't lost a single day's cycling due to bad weather. Admittedly we have been wet a few times but skin is waterproof and our powers of recovery are fast!

What a cycling year it has been so far! A very exciting Tour de France. Our local (now professional) rider Oscar Onley finishing 10th overall and winning the youngest rider prize in the Tour of Poland and the biggest cycling event in the world happening here on our doorsteps in Scotland with the UCI championships!

Recently I've been asked by a few potential riders for our Club how to get "bike fit" so I've compiled the following 3 week regime to help get everyone back in the saddle without too much effort.

Week 1. Cycle EVERY day to Cornhill and back (or a route of your choice of similar length) No more. No less. (2/3 miles)

Week 2. Cycle to Wark EVERY day (or a similar route of your choice) Once again no more. No less. (5/6 miles)

Week 3. Cycle to Carham EVERY day, the total distance there and back is only 12 miles. No more. No less.

Week 4. You are ready to take on the world. Increase your distances weekly to whatever you are comfortable with. You could then join the Club for our Sunday rides confident that you could manage. Even if you rode with us only for part of the route and built up from there, you would be well on your way to being "bike fit!"

It is important to cycle the required distance EVERY day. It can be in the morning, during the day or evenings. Whatever suits you! Missing a day or going further will not work! You MUST be consistent.

It is also important to stay hydrated so make sure your water bottle is full each time.

It is vital to wear a cycle helmet. As a Club we are strict on our Sunday rides. No helmet. No ride! It could save your life!

We meet and leave EVERY Sunday (weather permitting) from Court House Car Park at 9am. We cycle to Kelso to pick up more riders and then cover approximately 40 miles. Included in that ride we stop for coffee and cake (and a blether!) at some point. The pace is easy. The company and the craic is excellent and no-one gets left behind. The Club is free to join and there are no subscriptions to pay.

If you follow the above regime YOU could be joining us very soon. Age is no barrier (under 16s should be accompanied by a responsible adult) and certainly no excuse.

Follow us weekly on Facebook. Cycling is healthy exercise. Hope to see you all next Sunday.

COLDSTREAM MEDICAL PRACTICE SERVICE UPDATE

Civic Week has been and gone, schools are returning at the end of the holidays and that means that the "Flu Jab" season looms on the horizon.

Unfortunately, Staff members at Coldstream Medical Practice have been subjected to highly distressing and unnecessary abuse, so I thought that clarifying areas of responsibility for some services would be useful.

Due to changes ordered by Scottish Borders Health Board, our GP Practice can no longer offer any vaccinations/ immunisations.

All Childhood, Flu, Pneumovax, Shingles, Covid Booster and Travel vaccinations are now done by the NHS Borders Immunisation Team. Owing to the fact the service is entirely out of the Practice Team's hands they have no knowledge of when vaccination campaigns are running and no access to their appointments system.

A further source of patient frustration has been the Health Board Reception. (This is to the right on entering the practice.) This is staffed by the Health Board and again the Practice Staff members have no control over it. More importantly they have no access to this appointments system to help you.

Our Staff has taken it upon themselves to hold a stock of hearing aid batteries in reception having previously had to turn so many people away.

Physiotherapy and Podiatry services are accessed via self referral and the relevant forms can be obtained from the reception.

I would also like to highlight that this midsummer there were 75 appointments that patients did not attend and had not cancelled. This equates to 10 hours or 1 full day of appointments that could have been used by others. If you cannot attend please think of other patients and cancel your appointment.

Please be mindful that the Practice was not responsible for these changes and that the arrangements are totally beyond their control. **THERE IS NO PLACE FOR ABUSE OF PRACTICE STAFF**.

ECCLES POWER STATION DEVELOPMENTS WHY WE NEED BENEFITS FOR OUR COMMUNITIES

Many of you will know that several companies have applied for planning permission to put arrays of batteries near the Eccles electricity sub-station. That is so that power from renewable sources such as sun and wind can be stored, and used when the sun isn't shining and the wind isn't blowing. Some of you will also have been at meetings where this has been discussed, and where those present were clear in saving that the local communities near where these developments are taking place, Coldstream, Eccles, Leitholm and Birgham, should get a benefit. Many more of you will have spoken to friends and neighbours, and may also have put your names to our request, a request that says;

"We the undersigned request that the organisations seeking planning permission relating to electricity storage and transmission at Eccles Power Station guarantee that local communities receive concrete and specific benefits, such as community funding, from the investment in this critical infrastructure that are additional to those accruing from the infrastructure itself. The benefits will be agreed in discussion between the companies involved and representatives from the communities affected."

We think that close to half a billion pounds, (£500 million), and possibly more, is being invested just three miles up the road from Coldstream; we think it's only right that the local communities should get a share, and we are asking for your support, as we pursue that aim. These companies get permission to proceed from Scottish Ministers via a part of the Scottish Government called the Energy Consents Unit (ECU). The ECU takes comments from those interested into account when giving permission for developments.

We are a small group of people from Coldstream, including a Community Centre Trustee, a member of the Community Council, and other members of the community who are working on your behalf; we have been helped by many people who have gathered signatures and names in support of our request, but we need more help as we move forward.

What we have done so far

- We have gathered signatures from the local community (we have almost 500, but we need more)
- We have met with representatives of two of the companies, Intergen and Zenobe, and put our request to them.
- We have met with the local MP, John Lamont, and MSP, Rachael Hamilton, and gained their support.
- We have kept our local SBC Councillors informed, in particular, John Greenwell and Donald Moffat.
- We have made contact with representatives from Leitholm Eccles and Birgham Community Council, and will be having a meeting with them in the near future.
- We have put our views on the need for community benefits to the Energy Consents Unit on the two applications currently being considered. (We understand that one of these applications, from Zenobe, has been given consent by ECU)

Next Steps

This is likely to be a long haul, but we need to keep the pressure up, and continue to let these companies know that we expect local communities to benefit from this huge investment. We can do that best by showing them, and local and national politicians, that the community is behind this. If you need more information on the kind of thing that is being proposed, one of the companies is putting on consultation events in the Community Centre on Wednesday the 6th, and Wednesday the 20th September 1100-1400 and 1600-1900; go along and find out what they're proposing. We also have written information from another company that has already done a consultation that many of you may have missed.
