


hank you to all those local businesses and the Men's Shed who have helped us set up the larder and the garden. We are very grateful indeed for all your assistance.

# **Cherish our Swifts**

In Coldstream we're lucky with our wildlife; we can see salmon and otters in our river, in summer we have ospreys overhead and little egrets nesting. And, we have another summer visitor, the swift. These are wondrous birds, and have their name for a reason, because in level flight, they are our fastest birds, reaching 70 miles an hour. Once they leave the nest, they live in the air for

several years, never landing until they return to their nests after a migration of thousands of miles from Africa. And, they come back to the same nest sites year after year, for generations. They mate for life, so the same pair can return again and again. They gather in "screaming parties", their high pitched calls echoing around Coldstream on summer evenings (they're usually here between May and August). But, swifts are in trouble. Their numbers have decreased by more than half in Scotland, mainly because they nest in old buildings, often in holes just under the eaves, and if those holes are blocked or there's scaffolding put in the way, they can't nest, and their numbers will continue to decline. It's a sad thing to see swifts returning to their old nesting places again and again, only to find they can't get in, nest, and raise the next generation. But, we can change that. We can avoid getting in their way while they're here (there is an incentive, if you "intentionally or recklessly" block them from getting to their nests, you can get a fine of up to £5000 and up to six months in prison). We can also put up swift nesting boxes if our houses are suitable, just as has been done already at some houses and also at the Hirsel House. We can all play our part in encouraging our swifts to bring up more young in peace, and grace our summer skies for years to come. John Froggatt



### **Coldstream Parish Church news**



During January and February we have been holding services in the Church Hall while some alterations are being made in the Church. Meanwhile our Sunday services continue every week at 11.15 a.m. with help from retired ministers and from elders and members of the congregation.

The season of Lent is almost here. We will be having a joint Lent group with members of St Mary and All Souls Church to which anyone is welcome in our Church hall on Tuesday evenings at 7.30 p.m., starting on 20 February.

The Guild, meeting at 7.00 p.m. on the second and fourth Wednesday evenings each month have had a good year and will be breaking up at the end of March until the autumn. New members – male and female – are always welcome. Our other regular activities include: Men's Prayer Breakfast at 8.00-9.00 a.m. every other Saturday morning, at which all men will be warmly welcomed; "Sunday Sing", not a choir, just a chance to sing some contemporary Christian songs and old favourites, alternate Sundays at 10.15 a.m. in the hall before the service; a short, informal Iona-style service at 7.30 p.m., also in the hall, on the third Wednesday evening of the month; a joint Taize service at St Mary's at 5.00 p.m. on the fourth Sunday of the month; and a new ladies group meeting in the hall on alternate Wednesday mornings at 10.30 a.m. Check our website and/or Facebook page to confirm dates.


