Coldstream Men's Shed (CMS)

Gerry McCann - We are one of 138 sheds open across Scotland with another 65 under development. All are members of Scottish Men's Shed Association, the coordinating organisation, whose sole focus is to support, promote and represent Men's Sheds and its members. Also, it assists Scotland's 'Shedders' and their supporters to create Men's Sheds in their community to benefit health and wellbeing across Scotland. If you need help, inspiration or just a chart, you have

come to the right place. If you have time to spare and want to contribute to community-based projects, you will enjoy the company and a sense of achievement.

Recent examples of projects completed in the Coldstream area are renovation of Community Notice Boards; repairs to garden furniture; building bird feeders, nesting & planter boxes (standard and bespoke designs); wood lathe projects, dolls' houses, mud kitchens, model making and lately, various projects related to Civic Week.

CMS want to extend an invitation to community members that currently do not have a 'shed' to work from. The typical member is a retired male, but the offer really is open to anyone interested in taking part, regardless of age or gender. The current shed is situated in Victoria Street, Coldstream and is well equipped with all the tools required for wood-working projects. It also has a shop in the main street which sells products and items donated by the public.

By the very nature of its core membership, the average age trends upwards, and membership will reduce over time, unless an influx of new members can be attracted. The membership has not fully bounced back after the covid pandemic. Training and supervision will be provided. Mental Health Focus - Farming

Farming is a tough life and has naturally bred a toughness in all those who pursue this often under-rated, and at times, seemingly thankless existence. Consequently, farmers themselves have developed a resilience to the frequent changes and challenges they face without too much complaint. Despite increased demands, difficulties and workload, they still attempt to cope, much as their forefathers did, but these days virtually working alone.

Any outward signs of uncertainty or worry is often viewed by them as a weakness and therefore early symptoms of anxiety are ignored. Certain subjects become "not open for discussion" in the mistaken belief that problems disappear on their own, given time.


The idea that no one else truly understands their situation and by keeping worries to themselves, can easily start a pathway leading to isolation, loneliness or depression. They can become withdrawn, morose, snappy or even aggressive. Disturbed sleep patterns or changes to eating habits can also be signs of developing mental health issues. Feeling alone can lead some to seek solitary relief through less desirable pursuits such as excessive alcohol intake, drug taking, pornography or gambling, to name but a few, leading to increasing damage to not only their mental health but also to those close to them.

Family members and friends become nervous of raising concerns, increasing an already pressurised existence. Children particularly sense when things are not right but unfortunately blame themselves as being the cause, setting up further mental and emotional problems within their own lives. Left unchecked, over stressed families can erupt into arguments, violence, domestic abuse, self harm, divorce or even suicide. In fact, the suicide rate in farming and associated businesses is unacceptably high and yet nearly always preventable.

Farming life need not be so psychologically damaging for those involved if only it could be accepted that we are all human beings with both our strengths and frailties, that no man is an island, and seeking professional help with early intervention can prevent a further decline for farmers and their families alike. 



375th "Birthday Party"

As many of you will know, on Friday 8th August Coldstream Community Council hosted a celebration "Birthday Party" in Coldstream Community Centre to mark the 375th Anniversary of the inauguration of the regiment which in 1670 became The Coldstream Guards. In attendance were 140 guests including senior Coldstream Guards representatives Sir Michael Vernon, Colonel Hugh Toler and Canon Alan Hughes, as well as the Earl of Home, Lord Lieutenant Jeanna Swan, Watson McAteer SBC Convener and representatives from the majority of Coldstream's 40+ organisations and the town's folk. The guests of honour though, were of course the 16 Coldstream Guards from Number 7 Company under the command of Lieutenant Max Martin, who were piped in by Martin Arthur of Coldstream Pipe Band.

As Chair of CDCC I was charged with presenting a rousing "Welcome Home" speech and so drew particular attention to the similarities between the town's "namesake Regiment" and us, the people of the town. "Guards, we are like you in many ways", I said, "being a community which, when confronted with challenges, we close ranks, uniting in support of one another and forge tirelessly ahead, until we find solutions to those challenges."

The town's latest challenge is that following the publication in April of the Integratis report commissioned by SBC, the historic Headquarters of the Coldstream Guards, Coldstream Museum, was highlighted for possible closure along with our Library. I asked for the support of the Guards "to find a workable solution that will not just avoid this happening but will open new doors to enhance and develop our wonderful Border Toun into a "destination" one, putting it firmly on the map as it should rightly be."

Sir Michael Vernon and Lieutenant Max Martin provided an update on the regiment's recent activities after which, formalities over, the Guards were able to join in and create a real birthday party atmosphere mingling with the assembled company, sharing an excellent finger buffet provided by Michelle Stuart.

No birthday party is complete without a birthday cake and according to the Guards the one we had was the "most amazing cake we have ever seen." Not only was it magnificent in its design but it was also delicious! Carol Cockburn, you are our very own "Star Baker"!! There was even a party game, the fastest person to complete a 12-piece jigsaw of a Guardsman, which became extremely competitive amongst the Guards, the town's 3 Principals, and the other guests. The winner was our Coldstreamer!! Hip-hip-hooray!

With thanks to SBC for their support for the event, it was all in all, a lovely afternoon of celebration and a wonderful relationship building experience between Coldstream folk and our namesake regiment – both "Nulli Secundus"!!

Thank you to everyone who came along and supported this event and to the organisations in the town who contributed financially and in any other way. I only wish we could have had the whole town there but that would have been impossible!

Exercise Capstar Velo - The day after the party the Coldstream Guards cycling team participating in Exercise Capstar Velo arrived safely home in Coldstream completing their fundraising event. Michael Home - Following the closure of the Hirsel Golf Club we are now looking at how the area and the buildings might be used in the future. As a start it was wonderful to see the Civic Week Ball on site, which is something we hope might become a regular occurrence.

Bunk up lads, there's plenty space for a 'little-un' to join you. No fighting over the cushions! A noisy session awaits us today on the couch and a very warm welcome to Keith Guthrie & Ian Cockburn, Pipe Major and Lead Drummer of Coldstream Pipe Band. Hi guys.

Firstly Keith, that's a cracking picture on the cover. What were the highlights for you on that French trip? Keith -Thanks Chris. It was my first time in France so I didn't know what to expect but the trip was fantastic and we were very well looked after by our hosts in Bennecourt. The highlights for me were parading down the street in Mantes-la-Jollie followed by a Concert in the Notre Dame De Mantes. A personal thank you to the People of Bennecourt for making it so

What is the best thing about playing the pipes?

Keith - There is no other instrument like the highland bagpipe, it's famous throughout the world and usually gets a great reception, but to play in your own town, especially Civic Week is always the best!

And the worst?

memorable.

Keith - The baggines are one of the most complicated instruments, they are essentially 4 instruments in 1, three drones and the chanter (where the melody is produced). Keeping them in tune for any length of time is difficult to say the least!

What is the main function of the Pipe Major in a band?

Keith - The job of the Pipe Major is that similar to a musical conductor, tune selection, setting the desired tempo, overall tuning and sound of the band. I must add that I have a great team helping me to do this.

At what age did you start the pipes and why did you take them up?

Keith - I started when I was 8 years old, from a very young age I loved the pipe bands. Watching the band at Civic Week and watching the Edinburgh military tattoo on the telly. I wanted to play the drums but my Grandad convinced me to start the pipes, he was right!

How long did it take you to before you were good enough to start parading with the band?

Keith - I think it would have been a year roughly from learning on the practice chanter to moving onto the bagpipes and then getting all the tunes memorised.

How many pipers and drummers does the band have and are you looking for more?

Keith - I think we have 26 playing members but are always looking for more. Anyone that wishes to learn the bagpipes or drums will find the band's experienced tutors will be happy to teach you. Alternatively, if you can play and would like to get involved, please get in touch with Alex Thomson (Secretary) on 07747 145849.

What are main events the band contributes to?

Keith - We play throughout the year from Chirnside Civic Week to the Etal show, but the icing on the cake for us is Coldstream Civic Week, especially Flodden Day.

Apart from the tunes, what most goes through your head when you lead the band at the Flodden ride-out? Keith - As Pipe Major you are always listening to the sound of the Band but there are occasions when you get to soak in the atmosphere and enjoy the spectacle. It is the highlight of my year in the band.

What is your day job and what, other than piping, do you most enjoy doing?

Keith - I am a joiner and an on call firefighter so between Band practices and Fire training I try and spend time with my family, not that my wife would agree...

lan, you have been around the block several times (literally) with the band over many years and seen members come and go. Is this young whipper snapper of a Pipe Major any good?

lan- Keith has done an excellent job as Pipe Major since Duncan Bell moved to Glasgow. Not only is he a good piper but he also has good people skills which is very important when you are trying to keep 26 of us happy. He gets a great deal of support from our Pipe Sergeant Alistair Currie. Between them they have the pipers sounding very good.

Would you agree that the drums are a more important instrument?

lan - Without doubt the drums are more important. The beating heart of the Pipe Band. Some of the pipers might say that beating heart needs a pacemaker fitted though!!! There is lot of banter in the band between the pipers and drummers. Keith has already mentioned that he wanted to be a drummer and I am sure when there are twelve pipers to be tuned up before the Flodden parade he wishes he was. In every Pipe Band the pipers think they are more skilled than the snare drummers, the snare drummers think they are more skilled than the tenor drummers and the tenor drummers think they are more skilled than the bass drummer. But when the bass drummer isn't on it, the whole thing falls to pieces. Everyone is a small cog in the Pipe Band machine.

There seems to be a rush to the pub after a performance. Is it thirsty work? lan - Very thirsty work Chris. Soft drinks all round though!!!

In all your long years of beating out a rhythm, what is your proudest moment?

lan - I have had many memorable times with the Pipe Band including nearly every Civic Week since 1980. Visiting our twin town Bennecourt on several occasions as well as in France. Wales and Spain. I think the most memorable gig was the massed Pipe Bands at a packed Murrayfield for a six nations game between Scotland and England. (Scotland won by the way!). What makes me most proud though is seeing the pupils we have spent many hours teaching on a Monday night, playing in the Band.





